Special Aspects- Parksville Qualicum Beach-BCPQ- Dec.14, 2014-115th CBC

Clear skies overnight and during daylight hours helped lift the moods of field participants after an early December deep freeze followed by heavy rains with strong winds. Pockets of light frost were reported well inland. Rough seas and hazy conditions prevented clear views of many seabirds past 1km out on the Salish Sea. Several small groups of Greater White-fronted Geese in the area including 2 with 1 Snow Goose that have frequented Parksville Community Park since late November. This goose trio has been a topic of discussion and ID confusion by many. I had many calls from the public re the mysterious goose trio. Photos were taken and ID was confirmed by Denis Lepage of BSC. A high count of 123 Brant is very welcome in this community, they started arriving in early December. We got a second highest count of 522 Trumpeters, they were concentrated on the westside of the Count Circle at the Little Qualicum River mouth and in agricultural fields of Hilliers. Most of our dabbling ducks were in flooded fields well inland, one team's highlight was a mixed flock of about 3000 as they got spooked and moved over to a neighbouring field. 102 of the 110 Ringnecked Ducks were on Belle Lake in Errington. 39 White-winged Scoters is a second lowest count. 36 of the 49 Killdeer were all together in an agricultural field. Birders were lucky to find 3 Surfbirds seen at close range at Rathtrevor Beach along with other shorebirds. The 2117 Thayer's Gulls was a nice high count however the 10,096 total gulls counted does not reflect many more way out in deep water that birders could not ID due to rough seas and time constraints. The same situation applies to overall alcid numbers, one birder stopped counting Ancient Murrelets at 500 but many more were suspected.

The 5 Rock Pigeons counted is low, I know we missed many that roost near the local Buckerfield's and at the French Creek marina. Band-tail Pigeons have declined, a few have been seen in the Little Mountain area. Again, I think we missed many of the Eurasian Collared-Doves that often visit feeders and agricultural sites. Owling conditions were good, 3 Saw-whets were a welcome surprise. 83 Anna's Hummingbirds is a high count, yet I know of many more sites where they have been reported to me over the last few months. One feedercounter had an amazing 24 Annas' at his feeders, a regular occurance at this site near the mouth of Craig Creek. The Little Qualicum River area held 9 of our 20 Kingfishers. The 4 Townsend's Solitaires were at Little Mountain, heard and seen at close range. 1 Cedar Waxwing seen from a few feet away. Our warbler list is great: 1 Orange-crowned and 2 others for count week; 4 Yellow-rumps and 6 others for count week; a Townsend's pair; and a rare winter visitor, 1 count week female Yellow Warbler that arrived mid-Nov. and stayed until Dec. 17. It was photographed and seen numerous times at sugar water feeders in the Englishman R. estuary/Rathtrevor area. I will email the YEWA photos and rare bird form to the editor. We will settle for count week Pine Grosbeaks, quite a few sightings here through December. We had very few finches around, several small flocks of 20-60 Pine Siskins, 2 Evening Grosbeaks at feeders and several more for count week. At dawn the team covering Hamilton Marsh were shocked to hear volleys of shots close to them just as they reached the waters' edge, they retreated and returned later when the hunters were gone. Birders were welcomed by many land owners and organizations that allowed entry to their private or managed lands. Sandra Gray BCPQ compiler
