For our 25th BCPQ we got a welcome result of 104 volunteers. Our 55 field participants (highest over 25years), plus 36 Feedercount checklists that reflected 47 Feedercounters (2 also did a part day in the field), plus a crew of 4 who set up for our Post Count Potluck. Heavy rains early in December left many inland agricultural fields flooded for several weeks and attracted a good assortment of waterfowl and shorebirds. We had rain overnight, some ice over inland waters and mostly sunny skies with some cloud. Birders were happy with 16 high species counts and 6 count week species. 5 geese species were seen. Brant have been here since late November, arriving earlier now than in the past. Canada Goose numbers continue to climb. Large numbers of Pacific Loons and many divers were moving about on Georgia Strait way out in deep water, difficult to count and ID. This activity continues into January as they are joined by gulls and all wait for the herring to show. There were several sightings of one or more Yellow-billed Loons during count week. One Red-throated Loon is a rarity. Two Canvasback were reported before and after Count Day. Our sunny skies resulted in many raptor sightings, more than usual. Overall gull numbers of 3191 was low. 115 Anna's Hummingbirds were seen but missed at numerous other known locations, I suspect their numbers are far greater than tallied. 4 warblers were seen but others were missed at several known locations. Of note this year: we had a total of 4 youth on teams in the field, one team of 3 youth with 3 parents, another team of 4 family members including 1 youth. Compiler, Sandra Gray.
